Infrastructure Improvements

The Town completed some improvements, as well as received funding to implement improvements in the future. These improvements include

- New ceiling in the Justina Centre (upstairs only).

Safe Drinking Water

Water for drinking, cooking, brushing teeth, washing dishes, and other domestic uses should be from a safe water supply. Water should be free from microorganisms such as bacteria, that may cause disease. Testing your well water gives you a better picture of your well water quality and tells you whether or not it is safe to drink. It is recommended to have your water tested regularly for such contamination (once per year) or as required should you notice any change in colour or odor.

Unsatisfactory Result: E. coli is present. Water should be boiled and corrective action should be taken to deal with fecal contamination entering the well. Retesting should be carried out once corrective measures have been taken.

Substandard Result: Total coliforms are present but NO E. Coli. This is not an immediate health risk. Suitable disinfection of the well should be undertaken and the water retested to ensure there is no fecal contamination. Water MAY be boiled or an alternate safe source may be used until the retest results are known.

Satisfactory Result: E. Coli and total coliforms are not present. Water is safe and no further action is required



Water sample collection kits can be obtained at the Town Hall, located at 744 Logy Bay Road or from the Public Health Laboratory at the Miller Centre, Located on forest road. Driver and Pedestrian Safety



Say hello to Slow Down Sally! You might have seen her around the Town in various locations. Sally poses as a reminder to slow down when driving, and to be watchful for children and adults on, or near the roads in the Town to ensure their safety. This is another traffic control measure that we are implementing to help reduce speeding. These signs will be placed in various locations and will be periodically moved to alternate locations around the Town. Residents and visitors frequently spend time outside on their property or using the roadways in our Town. For the safety of others and yourself, pay attention while driving and obey the posted speed limits.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our Town has 2 community pantries! Our food pantry is located behind the Town Hall and our Book Pantry is located in Kelly Park. We encourage everyone to give to, and take from, these pantries.

Resident Spotlight - Martin Boland



Martin Boland is one of several members of the Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove community who share a family legacy. Along with the Power, Nugent, and Croke families, Martin Boland is descended from a team member of the famous Outer Cove crew who rowed in the 1901 Regatta. This team member was Martin's grandfather, also named Martin Boland.

The story of the 1901 Regatta is held up by the Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove community as a moment of particular pride for the town. Even 120 years later, the incredible feat of sportsmanship demonstrated that day by the men of Outer Cove continues to be celebrated in poems, songs, books, and local folklore.

The story goes that the Outer Cove crew rowed in the 1901 Royal St. John's Regatta and finished with a time of 9 minutes and 13 seconds. This set a record that stood undefeated for 80 years. And doubly impressive is that when the Outer Cove crew set the record in 1901, they were beating an old record they had previously set in 1885. So Outer Cove held the record time for 96 years altogether, an unbelievable accomplishment.

Martin never got the chance to know his grandfather very well, as he passed away when Martin was three years old. However, he always had an interest in family history, and so sought out opportunities to learn more about his family's past. In the 1990s, Martin approached his mother with questions about his grandfather's experience rowing in the 1901 Regatta. She told him what she could, and then suggested that he get in touch with a gentleman named Willie Croke who would be able to tell him more.

Willie had moved to Detroit in the 1950s, but was originally from Outer Cove and had a remarkable amount of knowledge about the area's history. The two exchanged letters and telephone calls, with Martin recording as much information as he could about his grandfather and the 1901 Regatta. It was through this research that Martin learned more about the rowing legacy that has continued to shape his community and family over the decades.

Martin also recalls hearing Charlie Power describe his grandfather. According to Charlie, the elder Martin Boland was not tall, but was very strong. He was a lifelong carpenter, and the years of honing his craft made him a powerfully built man.

This was the case for many of the early rowers in the Regatta. These men spent long hours working hard, and so did not have time for many leisure activities. But their work did make them very fit for rowing, and they always made time to participate in this sport which has always meant so much to the town.

Martin explains that an enthusiasm for the sport of rowing has always brought the town together. In a town like Outer Cove, which he remembers from his youth as a tightly-knit place with 50 or so families, a love of rowing flowed in the town's blood. Martin's father did not row himself, but Martin remembers hearing that his father came close to quitting a job because his employer wasn't willing to give him Regatta Day off work. On Regatta Day, the whole town would gather by the lakeside, coming together to cheer on their team. Of course, a bit of healthy competition was also involved. The good-natured rivalry between Outer Cove and Torbay was always a strong motivation to support the local team.

Martin himself rowed in a Regatta, in about 1961. He says that he would have loved to row in more races, but he joined the seminary shortly thereafter and so wasn't allowed to participate any longer. His eldest son has also carried on the family legacy and rowed in one Regatta for a St. John's team. When we spoke with him, Martin very generously agreed to bring in the medal awarded to his grandfather when his team set the record in 1901. Martin cherishes this prized family heirloom and is proud to be part of such a wonderful legacy of sportsmanship and community spirit.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Royal St. John's Regatta is the oldest organized sporting event in North America. It has been a part of Newfoundland history for over 200 years. The first record of an organized event was in 1816, but rowing matches were common among ship's crews in St. John's Harbour since at least the 1700's.

Festival of Friends Recap

DID YOU KNOW?

INAPPROPRIATE ATV USAGE can affect peoples livelihood! ATV's are prohibited along public roadways, highways and private property. Hiking the East Coast Trails



Silver Mine Head Path is 3.8km long (one way), and takes 2 hours. The trail is rated as easy. The trail starts at Middle Cove Beach and ends at Motion Drive Extension in Torbay. Keep an eye out for caplin and whales in season, and enjoy the scenic views

Did you know the Town of Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove is home to three East Coast Trails? These three trails are 1. Silver Mine Head Path 2. Cobblers Path and 3. Sugarloaf Path.

Cobblers Path is 5km long (one way) and takes 2-3 hours. The trail is rated as moderate. The trail starts near the designated parking lot off Cobbler Crescent. The trail leads to Dorans lane. There is an extension of the trail that leads to the scenic Torbay point.

Sugarloaf Path is 8.8km long (one way), and takes 3-5 hours. The trail is rated moderate to difficult. The trail begins near the Marine Lab in Logy Bay and ends in Quidi Vidi Village. The trail has Two major elevations changes of 150m and provides some amazing views of Logy Bay and Quidi Vidi

TRAIL TIPS

The following are some trail etiquette tips for ways to reduce your impact on the environment:

- No open fires are permitted on the East Coast Trail; use a backpack or camping stove if you wish to cook while on the trail.
- Please hike on the developed trail to protect vegetation and prevent erosion.
- Respect the peace & quiet of the wilderness and the privacy of people who live nearby.
- Pack it in. Pack it out. Please remove all trash.

WEXFORD ESTATES OUTER COVE MARINES

The Wexford Estates Outer Cove Marines hockey club is a non-profit organization comprised of local players, coaches and volunteers. The Marines play out of Jack Byrne Regional Sports & Entertainment Centre in the Avalon East Senior 'A' Hockey League (AESHL). This franchise has a storied history in the senior hockey circuit in Newfoundland and Labrador, with connections to individuals who have paved the way for hockey and sports in the Cape St. Francis region. The Outer Cove Marines were one of the original teams involved in the AESHL from its conception in 1966. The return of this franchise to the AESHL in 2022 is focused on the community, providing leadership and support to minor hockey and junior hockey programs, and promoting access to sports for children in the area. Through community partnerships, such as with the Ron Cadigan Foundation, the Wexford Estates Outer Cove Marines will support and celebrate youth involved in sports across the region.
